




Tony Goddard joined the Rotary Club of Ayr, District 9550 in 1994. He was Club President in 2000-2001. He has held a number of positions within the club including Secretary for some years, along with various other Director Positions. He is a Paul Harris Fellow and was also named as the inaugural Rotarian of the Year Award for his Rotary Club in 2004-2005.

He has previously served on the District 9550 Youth Exchange Committee for many years including Secretary for some years and also Country Co-ordinator for South American Countries including Brazil and Peru along with South Africa.

In 2003-2004 Tony and his wife Marion, accompanied 70 Australian YEP students enroute to Europe (Frankfurt) via Japan where they were safely assisted to their final destinations as part of the YEP program between Australian Rotary Districts and European countries.

Up until 12 months ago Tony had been the D9550 Chair for the GSE Program and more recently District Chair for the Future Vision VTT Program where D9550 were one of Ten Pilot Districts to have participated in this program worldwide in 2011. The District is continuing to be involved in Rotary Foundation Programs with a number of Teams/Clubs conducting projects in Dili, East Timor, part of D9550 and Detroit D6400 USA.

In 2005 Tony was Team Leader for the D9550,GSE team which travelled to D2350 in Sweden. The team undertook studies and participated in various events in the Stockholm area of this District, culminating in the D2350 Rotary Centennial Cruise to Finland.

Tony retired from the workforce in July 2012 following 38 years as a Police Officer with the Queensland Police Service.

Tony and Marion have three children, Joshua, Jacinda and Brittany and three grandchildren – Aidan, Indianna and Remmie. Apart from Rotary, Tony enjoys many sports, is an avid Cowboys/Queensland Rugby League and cricket supporter. Tony and Marion are also keen Touch Football players and officials with both travelling all over the country along with participating and being generally involved with this sport.

Worldwide travel is one of their favourite enjoyments with many overseas trips already taken and many planned in the future including some 'Grey Nomading' along the way.



OUR DISTRICT

Clubs are grouped into 530 Rotary **districts** worldwide, each led by a **District Governor** (elected annually) who is directly responsible for the administration of the district. There are 23 Rotary Districts in Australia.



Rotary International District 9550 is one of the most diverse Rotary Districts in the world, covering 1.5 million square kilometres north of the 21st parallel in the Northern Territory and Queensland in Australia, and East Timor (Timor Leste). The District is vastly diverse, and includes the world heritage areas of Kakadu National Park and the Great Barrier Reef, rainforests, tropics and the outback. The District is renowned for its agriculture, cattle, fishing, horticulture, mining, sugar cane, tropical fruits, and tourism.



District 9550 has 45 clubs and about 1300 members. Within our District, East Timor covers an area of 15,000 square kilometres and has a population of about one million people. Its natural environment is marked by stunning mountains, beautiful beaches and reefs, lush forests and, depending on the season, rushing rivers or dry riverbeds.

However East Timor is one of the ten poorest countries in the world. The problems faced by East Timor are compounded by the lack of infrastructure and a critical shortage of skills in most areas of vocation. The East Timorese regard education as the most important priority in the development of their country, because it is the lack of people with the expertise and technical skills to rebuild the country that remains the most critical stumbling block for development. The Rotary Club of Dili was chartered in 2002.



Multicultural Darwin is the capital of the Northern Territory, and has a population in excess of100,000. It has a young population and vibrant economy, Charles Darwin University, and a major liquefied natural gas plant that commenced production in 2006. Darwin is the closest Australian city to Dili in East Timor, being only a 1 hr 45 min flight away. There are eight D9550 Rotary clubs in the Territory, with five in Darwin.



Townsville is situated on the east coast of North Queensland. It has a population of about 160,000 and has an excellent James Cook University that is renowned for its Marine Sciences. There are 12 Rotary clubs in the area. Throughout towns to the south are another five Rotary Clubs, fertile sugarcane farming region, and the famous Whitsunday beaches and islands.


350 kilometres north of Townsville is the lush, tropical city of Cairns. It has a population of 140,000 and is known as the gateway to the Great Barrier Reef. Cairns is home to seven Rotary clubs, with another 12 clubs located in towns to the north, south and west.

900 kilometres west of Townsville and in the outback is Mount Isa, the mining, industrial and commercial centre of Northwest Queensland. There are four Rotary Clubs in this region. Our **Rotary International District 9550** covers about 20% of Australia – a 1.5 million square kilometer area north of the 21st parallel in Queensland and the Northern Territory (including as far south as Tennant Creek), and Timor Leste, where there is a Rotary Club in Dili. There are nine Rotary Clubs in the Northern Territory, with clubs in Darwin, Nhulunbuy, Katherine and Tennant Creek, while in North Queensland clubs extend from Thursday Island and Cairns in the north to Proserpine and Airlie Beach in the south, and west to Mount Isa. Our District includes the world heritage areas of Kakadu National Park and the Great Barrier Reef, rainforests, tropics, and the outback.

25 YEARS OF MEMORIES

As we start thinking about our formal
25th Birthday celebrations later this year our
Club Secretary and Charter member Martyn
Wilkinson has contributed a few of his
recollections

1989 and I had been in Darwin North Rotary Club for about 2 years, and although I enjoyed the fellowship, I did not enjoy getting fined every meeting for turning up late. Our relatively new road transport business Northline Freight, was growing well but required a lot a hours and it was difficult to get away at the end of the day to attend the 6.30 pm start of the evening Rotary meeting.

When it was mooted to start a new club which met at the start of the day, this seemed the obvious choice for me, at least I stopped getting fined.

We met in the same place that most of the then 7 Rotary Clubs met, at the RSL Cavenagh St and the breakfast menu actually changed from time to time I seem to recall corn beef fritters as a highlight.

As inaugural Secretary, many of the elements of the meeting which were considered "new" to our club such as "job" and "me" talks remain today although. I note that other meeting items such as the "2 mins of Rotary Information" Roster, no longer exist.. (Editor's note - a much younger Martyn at the Club's 2001 Christmas Carols)

As in any club we had a number of significant characters.

One of the first sergeants we had was a lawyer called Kim Graves (Who would have thought humour and lawyer in the same sentence) Kim left Darwin to specialize in Mining Law and at last report was a high flying corporate lawyer with the BHP group.

Who can forget the memorable Sunday morning cinema events where Frank Lam provided the Mongolian food packs and Dan Styles (Who was the manager of the Darwin Cinema) combined to great effect, we had the run of the whole complex to ourselves, which doesn't seem to happen these days.

As far as I am aware the only time a membership application was rejected by the club was one that I put forward. The guy was a manager of a national company in Darwin and one of our members had some dealings with one of the employees who advised that our proposed member had not allowed the staff any time off to give blood at the Red cross. Hardly the attributes of a community minded individual and his membership application lapsed. It wasn't long before he moved on and left town as was a common theme with a lot of our members.





The Orchid Spectacular was an early fund raiser that Gerry Swan was in charge of for a number of years , the most memorable event was 2000 when after the first day of the 2 day event , we got a message from the authorities saying that the whole Marrara complex had to be cleared. cleaned and emptied by Sunday morning as it was needed to house a flood of East Timorese refugees that were arriving on the first planes out .

As MLA Mick Palmer commented often, 'We had the only flower show in the country that was closed down by the police'. An added bonus that year was that the NT government compensated us for loss of profits to the tune of \$5000 odd, something

I don't think we would expect these days.

A good number of the Club members along with the First Paramedic of the Year – Jim Leigh Millennium year – 10 years after Chartering – Charter Member Sivaram Vemuri was President



These days you might call it "Photo bombing" but in 2005, A visiting Rotarian called Peter Armitage who was a professional photographer, sent us this pic from his make up at the club, when we used to meet at the Crowne Plaza. You might spot some familiar (younger!) faces.

Centre of the photo is the gong we received as a charter gift that never worked, it made a dull "thud" that no-one could hear, so we were relieved to take custody of the Port Darwin Gong that we currently

use that makes a good "gong" noise

You will note at the back of the above photo, our larger than life member Graham Wright, one of his lasting legacies that Graham left the club, and there are plenty of others, was the introduction of the "foundation raffle". Of the tickets you buy every meeting, according to Grahams formula, 60% of the revenue goes to the Foundation and 40% goes back to the raffle prize pool. This year it has raised approx. \$1500 for the Rotary Foundation (Our own charity).



Deputy Denis Carroll, Ken Hatfield, Julie Nicholson, Sandy Oldroyd, Malika Okeil, Morgan Ewing, Jan Conti, Joy Passmore, Quentin Kilian, Rob Dorgelo, Allison Hooper, Marguerite Bowen and Judy Chan.

It is now time to welcome our new Director in Denis Carroll and wish him all the best for his incoming year.

COMMUNITY SERVICE

The Duck Race

The Club has continued in its community interaction - joint fundraising activity with its involvement in the second year of 'Duck Racing' with Nightcliff Football Club and the Rotary Club of Darwin Sunrise hosting the second Annual Duck Race. This event was held in the Wave Pool at the Waterfront precinct with an increase to 1500 multi coloured ducks taking to the water. A larger crowd than last year 'got down' to see this fantastic event happen. The Club received a donation of \$1700 from the organisers for our Community Chest.





The Australian Rotary Health (ARH)

We continued to join with ARH to provide a \$5,000 Indigenous Scholarship for Medicine. Ian Lee, local man, was awarded this competitive scholarship and continues to undertaking study in the CDU and Flinders University program. In addition to the Medical Scholarship the Club continued to support the ongoing programs of ARH with a contribution of \$25.00 per Active member which amounted to \$1,050.



Ludmilla Primary School

This financial year saw the completion of the Ludmilla Primary School Project. A joint partnership was established with Bunning's who supplied two additional modular benches to the kitchen area to further increase the educational, nutritional and learning abilities for all the students.



This enabled our Club to donate \$1700.00 to stock the kitchen with essential equipment such microwave oven, pots, pans and utensils. small cooking presentation was carried out at the school with Rotarians and Education Staff to formally handover and most complete this worthwhile project for the children and parents of the Ludmilla Primary School.



Clean Up Australia Day

Many thanks to Malika Okeil and Roger Pocock for coordinating the contact point for the Clean Up Australia Day in the East Point Precinct. It was a much nicer day weather wise than last year which in encouraged excellent roll up an of local volunteers that included many community members as well Rotarians. Once again a vote of thanks goes out to Allison Hooper for organising the Girl Guides, who do a brilliant job in assisting with the clean-up.

The Cowdy Ward

The ongoing funding to provide the NT News and Weekend Australian newspapers to the patients of the Cowdy Ward at Royal Darwin Hospital at a cost of \$700.

The Knockabout Chefs Program

The ongoing funding of five annual scholarships to provide the student's basic requirements to commence the course. In addition we fund the annual Rotary Club of Darwin Sunrise Knockabout Chefs' Achievement Award. The provision of \$1,250 in support of this worthwhile community project of St Vincent de Paul.

A new program this year was the \$400 sponsorship of a respite day for underprivileged children and carers (4 of both) at the Nightcliff Bowling complex for a fun day.

The Annual Cambodian Cultural Exchange Program.

It's NT leader is David Armstrong from the NT Open Education Centre. At the end of the school year 12 students travel to Cambodia to work in villages to provide educational, health services and time to build some homes for families. The students fund their own costs and our club has donated \$2,000 to purchase building materials for the houses.



International Student Volunteer to Africa

Teana Mangion is a Pharmacy student at Charles Darwin University. The Club supported her time in Africa with a donation of \$500.

The Elizabeth Academy in Manila

The amount of \$1000 donation from the Club has been personally matched by Judy Chan and Sang Er (Judy's Husband) . Judy will do a presentation to the club in August to cover the project fully, but as a passionate educator Judy convinced the board that a donation to this building project increasing the capacity of a small primary school located in the slum area of Manilla, would use education to break the poverty cycle, and fit with the Rotary International focus area of supporting education.

Typhoon Halyan in the Philipines

The Club supported relief for this natural disaster with a \$500 donation to the District fundraising program organised amongst all Rotary Clubs.



National Youth Science Forum

Each year the Rotary Clubs in Darwin combine resources to identify, select and fund three or five Year 11 students to attend this forum in Universities in either Canberra, Melbourne or Perth.


I love that we can all do something (big or small) to serve our community and there's a great sense of achievement and fulfilment that comes from that.

Joe was born in Beaufort Victoria, a small country town that hasn't changed much in the years since.

After completing secondary school Joe obtained employment with the then Bank of New South Wales (now Westpac) where he was sent to work in branches in various country towns in Victoria.

With Joe getting thoroughly sick of small country towns he successfully landed employment with ASIO in the real big smoke – Sydney. Joe was eventually posted to Darwin in 1966 where he was the Number 2 guy in ASIO and also had responsibilities for Alice Springs where the 'Space Base' was being built.

In 1978 Joe was seconded by the Dept of Defence to go to the 'Space Base' at Alice Springs. Joe eventually resigned from the Government to stay in Alice Springs where he became an Insurance Assessor and eventually bought the business. Seeking to expand, in 1989 Joe opened a branch office in Darwin and moved here.

Joe was a dedicated and enthusiastic Rotarian – giving 35 years of 'Service Above Self'. He commenced his Rotary journey at the Rotary Club of Alice Springs Stuart from 1979 to 1989 then to the Rotary Club of Port Darwin from 1989 to 2005 where he was honoured with the award of a Paul Harris Fellowship and served the Club with dignity and honour as President.

In 2005 under his leadership Port Darwin amalgamated with Darwin Sunrise. In July 2008 Darwin Sunrise awarded Joe Honorary Membership in recognition of his untiring, dedicated and outstanding service to Rotary and the community.

He and Marilyn joined the 'grey nomads' of Australia and had many years exploring our great country and travelling overseas until his passing on Thursday 6th February 2014.

Proposal for a Sensory Garden Project – Gunbalanya Early Learning Centre

Project Objective

To create a Garden in the Gunbalanya Early Learning Centre Playground to enhance the wellbeing and learning of the children. Also to provide a horticulture/agricultural facility for the Gunbalanya High School students and provide skills development for those community residents building equipment/items as part of the project.



History

Our club visited Gunbalanya Community in October 2012 and had a look at the High School, Early Education Centre, Arts Centre and Abattoir. We also had a tasty lunch kindly hosted by James Smith, an Associate Member of the club, who had moved to Gunbalanya with a new job.





Following a submission from the community, our club secured a \$4000 Rotary Foundation grant in late 2013 to assist the Early Learning Centre/Pre-School with the development of a garden as per the project objective.



The school identified a range of tools and items from Bunnings to assist with the establishment of, and facilities in, the garden. Following some delays due to flooding in the community along with school holidays etc, they finally took delivery of the first part of their order in May 2014. Work started immediately on designing and making items for the pre-school.



Many of the items will be made by community members with recycled material As pictured a cleaver - joint threesome tricycle adaptation repaired ready for some fun.



Gordon Canning, Classroom Teacher reported:

We've only just begun (to make items for the garden), and some of these will be replicated and we will be designing more in the near future. We have made a woodwork table, designed a bike rack and designed a large storage/planter box. The kids are just about ready to start using their woodwork table and I will send pictures of us once we begin.

The tools were also used to finish our duck shed - the ducks are enjoying their new pond and our BBQ looks brilliant! I think the kids are hoping for BBQ duck before too long! I want to thank you again for this very generous donation.

Once the remainder of the tools and equipment has arrived, the community will provide the receipts and the grant will be acquitted.



We in the Club are looking forward to following the progress of this project, and to hopefully visiting the community again sometime in the near future.
























2013 - 2014 TREASURER'S REPORT



Joseph Aladin

I had big shoes to fill when I took over the Treasurer's role from Ian Berry in July 2013.

My biggest challenge was to understand the club's individual transactions and record them consistently with the previous year. With the support provided by the Board, I was able to have an understanding of the finances and financial reporting requirements of the club.

I continued using Reckon Accounting software for recording the Club's financial transactions which facilitated my role.

We had a major shift in paying for the club transactions after we have organised electronic banking with the ANZ bank. Our use of the cheque book has been lesser as we were able to pay by Electronic Funds Transfer (EFT) since we have set up electronic banking. No chasing for cheque signatories was great.

I did not instigate any major changes with the classification of the transactions as I am new to the role but would like to implement some changes so that anyone reading our financial report will have a better understanding of our financial situation and condition.

I am lucky to be re-elected as Treasurer again for the second year running as I can implement some changes. An example would be showing the funding and expenditure in the same year (eg Gunbalanya, funds received in 2013, but expended in 2014).

INCOME

New major Fundraising for the year was for sale of Christmas puddings and cakes prepared locally in Darwin by Karen Sheldon Catering Pty Ltd and Sponsorship received from various Darwin health organisations for our Mental Illness Forum. Car parking fundraising did not happen this year.

There was no grant received this year compared to last year when a grant for Gunbalanya was received.

Total income reduced by 9% compared to last year. Material movement in the major components of income are as follows:

- Fundraising income increased by 2%
- Membership dues increased by 18%
- Meeting income decreased by 7%
- PolioPlus fund raising decreased by 33%



EXPENSES

Total expenses increased by 5%, and were comprised mainly of:

- Increase by 348% of fund raising
- Decrease by 18% of Meeting
- Decrease by 22% of Rotary External
- Increase by 27% of Service project

Overall, there was a net surplus of \$1,961 for the year which is equivalent to 3% of total income. Last year's proportion of surplus to total income was at 16%.

It is worth noting that the Service Project expenditure for Medical Trainee Indigenous sponsorship is matched by the Australian Rotary Health 100% while the CEO Sleepout was paid through Givematcher and was matched 100% by another organisation.

Gunbalanya grant received last year was expended this year.
